Inclusive Education

The term inclusive education means much more than integrated education. It refers to an education system that accommodates all children regardless of their physical, intellectual, social, emotional, linguistic or other conditions. The range of challenges confronting the school system while including children with diverse abilities and from diverse backgrounds have to be met by creating a child-centered pedagogy capable of successfully educating all children. An inclusive class may have amongst others, children with disability or gifted children or working children, children from remote or nomadic populations, children belonging to ethnic, linguistic or cultural minorities or children from other disadvantaged or marginalized groups.

SCERT, Assam has been taking up measures for implementation of integrated education since the days of DPEP. In the present times the SCERT is working in the area of inclusive education in collaboration with SSA, Assam. It has under taken orientation programmes for teacher educators on inclusive education-Methodology an implementation. The department of Education of Children With Special Needs, (CWSN), ECCE and special focus group of SCERT is working specifically for visually impaired children by developing Braille textbooks with financial support from SSA, Assam. Textbooks of classes I-VIII (Language, Mathematics, EVS, Science, Social Science), total 25 books have been transcribed into Braille keeping in mind the following guideline.

Guideline for Development of Braille Text Books for Elementary Level

- 1. The Textbooks developed by SCERT, Assam (Class I-VIII) are transcribed into Braille.
- 2. The Braille Text Books is not a work Book.
- 3. Pictures depicting content, activities, evaluation are converted to elaborated texts.
- 4. Self learning activities are to be done with the guidance of the teacher, Guardian or classmates.
- 5. Provision of learning through concrete materials is provided.
- 6. Competencies to be developed are not compromised with but the process of learning is facilitated as per the possibilities of a visually impaired child.
- 7. Drawing and colouring activities are not incorporated but are replaced with activities which a child can make.

The department also intends to take up the following course of action for CWSN in the near future.

- 1. Formulation and implementation of alternative methods of evaluation, modification of curriculum and sensitization of teachers.
- 2. Curriculum adaptation and modification for slow learners and intellectually impaired children.
- 3. Skill enhancement programmes for teachers and teacher educators.
- Development of TLM based on Braille textbooks (Mathematics, Science, Social Science)
